Bone is quite rightly one of the best-selling series for young readers. Smith gets together with some of his pals like Stan Sakai. Tom Sniegoski. Katie Cook and others to tell More Tall Tales (Graphix/Scholastic). "You have to have big ideas to wear the big hat," Smiley Bone so rightly says. So he passes that hat around and everybody around the campfire gets to spin a story, even Bartleby the rat creature kid. It's a fun

book that you oughta read just for the giant vulture. Our next item is somewhat more down-toearth. No giant vultures, just vampires. And their opposition, sparkly girls from outer space. Or at least a bunch of tween chicks pretending to be these things as part of their new school club. See, Sasha's middle school has a new principal, a former pro football player and author of a bestselling book on self-improvement, and he's made some changes. Like cancelling home economics and cosplay club and pretty much any school group that isn't attached to the sports program. That leaves Sasha and her fellow nerds high and dry, until one night, they are introduced to the King of Sports, professional wrestling! Inspired by the glories of the squared circle, Sasha and gang form Club Kick Out! Blending athletics, theatre and costuming, Club Kick Out gets a tentative okay from the principal, and then the real work



begins. The rest of Volume 1, Into the Ring, involves not just the blood, sweat and tears of physical training and stagecraft. Author Steph Mided also understands the ins and outs of school politics, especially the ups and downs involved with any group run for and by kids, much less one with the potential for disaster as a professional wrestling club. Good luck getting our next comics superstar anywhere near that kind of action. It's Melanie Watt's charmingly chicken-hearted Scaredy Squirrel! Scaredy Squirrel Gets Festive in his latest Steeping Stone Book from Random House. Scaredy has the perfect Christmas party all planned out. Now all he needs is help to put it together. Unfortunately, his pals don't seem to get where Scaredy's coming from- I mean, seriously, yes, a toad is green, but not really Xmas green, you know? But the Christmas spirit prevails nad Scaredy, Ivy, Time and Rash have a good time after all. It's good to have friends. Especially when you're the Quenn of the Moon, and somebody's trying to poison you with The Soup of Doom! The



second novel starring the First Cat in Space finds that fearless feline and his galpal the Moon Queen on a quest for the cure. Meanwhile, their long-lost homie LOZ 4000 (the Toenail-clipping Robot) learns of his friends' struggle and looks to get the band back together. The First Cat in Space and the Soup of Doom is another bombastically Baumian fantasy frolic from Mac Barnett and Shawn Harris. Unapologetic realism is the hallmark of Layers (First Second). This Memoir by Eisner Award winner Penelope Bagieu is made up of sixteen discrete but not discreet stories spanning the years from childhood to early adulthood. It's casually honest in that European way, especially about sex and all its complications, so caveat lector. With a natural flow and vivid personality, Bagieu's cartooning is a Xmas gift!
