


The horror revival of the 1970s is covered in pieces on Warren's would-be competitors such as Seaboard and Skywald (publisher of *Psycho*, left), Marvel's GIANT-SIZE monster books, and DC's belated but beloved attempts to bring gothic romance to comics (near left). Covers devoted to hypodermic needles...artists such as Berni Wright -son and Al Luster...post-Code creepers and Brazilian chillers (right)...that and so much more await the eager attentions of fervent fright freaks!









Dark Horse continues to crank out the paper-back versions of their reprints of the Warren magazines. Originally published in the 1960s, Creepy and Eerie resurrected horror comics by side-stepping the Comics Code through a change in format. Black and white comics magazines allowed for both thematic and artistic freedom. Editor and head writer Archie Goodwin hired artists such as Reed Crandall and Angelo Torres who had worked on the classic EC books while giving refuge to stars of the spinner rack like Gene Colan and Steve Ditko, who produced





Numerous factors, including the sabotage of *Blazing Combat* by distributors, led to **Jim Warren** cutting back on page rates. Other disagreements led to the departure of **Goodwin**, leaving **Warren** without his main writer while his best artists hit the bricks. He also was feeling the heat from his competitors.
