





If it seems there's not as many comics on LPL shelves as there should be, you're right. Not to spill the tea, but Lexington Public Library has been having some issues with our main distributor. We're working on it. In the meantime, the relative lack of new material affords us the chance to go back and discuss some things that flew under the radar when they first came out. Like My Fairy Godfather; it's hardly a surprise it comes from the Fantagraphics Underground imprint, given how much the artwork of Jon Sack resembles Fantagraphics cartoonists both famous like Daniel (Eightball) Clowes and forgotten, like Mark Zingarelli, who just passed away at the age of 72 this past April. He got his start like a lot of Nineties names, working for alternative weeklies and drawing stories for the likes of Dennis Eichorn and Harvey Pekar. His solo title Real Life reflected the confessional realism of those writers. Sack follows in those footprints.

His artwork mixes the slickness of romance comics with the bland naturalism of realist comics, a perfect approach to this saga of hicksville kulturkampf. A small town in Kansas claims to be the birthplace of Dorothy while maintaining a less-than-welcome attitude to the "friends of Dorothy". Into this quiet conflict comes out-of-towner Billie, who slowly but surely turns up the volume. A loving look at film and family and the meaning of both, My Fairy Godfather is available via lexpublib.org. For some odd reason, the problem we've been having with adult comics has not stemmed the tide of comics for kids. So take a gander at the Original Graphic Collection Around the Spider-verse. The younger members of Marvel's Spiderverse get a their turn in the limelight, Arana helps OG Spidey while facing down the Rhino and his boss, the devilish daughter of Kraven the Hunter!



Then Miles Morales finds adventure and mystery at New York's famous Museum of Natural History, Or should I say, adventure and...Mysterio? Then SpiderGwen, AKA Ghost Spider, has to deal with jealousy from an old friend and obsession from a new foe. All the artwork is a nice mix of practical and digital effects; I especially like Maca Gil's candyland colors on the Gwen Stacy story. Check the NEW J 741.5 section at your favorite LPL location! Meanwhile, Saladin Ahmed's supernatural take on the Man Without Fear spirals ever closer to its hellish conclusion with Living Hell. The man the denizens of Hell's Kitchen have long called the Devil finds himself trading blows with the real thing. Already pushed to his physical and spiritual limits. Matt Murdock must face the ultimate horror: Wilson Fisk possessed! Even with Elektra by his side, can Daredevil triumph over a Kingpin empowered by the hordes of Hell? Go to Beaumont, Central and Eastside to see! J NEW at all LPL locations is where you'll find the utterly enchanting Misfits of Magic. DC's Misfits, to

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be exact, so we get a kiddie comic take on classic horror heroes like Blue Devil, the Enchantress and Sargon the Sorcerer. Deadman shows up dressed like a Hawaiian tourist, and there's even a cameo by Destiny of the Endless! Matthew Dow Smith writes with a good ear for the rhythms of teenage jabber and draws in a open scrawly line that holds the bright colors well. There are some pages of artwork in our last item, but all in black and white. That's because it's a novel by Alex (Poe Dameron) Segura, the seguel to his Secret Identity (see 741.5 # 77). Set in the present, Alter Ego follows comics creator-turned-Hollywood hot potato Annie Bustamante as she confronts mystery and danger while working on her favorite heroine, the legendary Lynx! Alter Ego is murder mystery and cultural commentary on comics biz!
