


Based on true events, Visitations is cataloged under B Eg17a1 in the TEEN section of all LPL locations. The "visitations" that give the book its title are of the everyday kind—the visitations granted by the court to Corey's father after his parents' bitter divorce, which eventually provoke his deeply religious mother to take Cory and his little sister and go on the run. And of the otherworldly aind— the vision of a spectral girl Corey has in the desert sands next to Area 51, an adolescent angel who opens Corey's heart and mind to new vistas of being and belonging. A harrowing saga of faith and family, Cory Egbert's Visitations is a graphic revelation.















Her father dead, Helen ends up the charge of her grandfather at the fabulous Wyndhorn Manor, under the tutelage of governess Lilith Appleton. That's the Gothic part. The first was born the moment the first atomic bomb detonated at Trinity. The rest came later; as a result, metahumans are called "Atomics." That, and the fact each one of them is a walking Hbomb waiting to go off. Some have. Just ask Tokyo Or what's left of the Eurasian landmass. A power struggle has ensued between Atomics desiring total

We face yet another paradox thanks to the supply issues that have bedeviled LPL. We received the first chapter of the new run of Detective Comics before the final chapter of Ram V's "Gotham Nocturne" opus, which is still in the pipeline. The penultimate chapter of that story arc, aptly entitled "Intermezzo," is available at all LPL locations. Unearthly aristocrats the Orgham Family have closed on their claim to Gotham. To signify their triumph, the Orghams plan to hang Batman in the public square. Plenty of Gothamites aren't down with that, including Selina Kyle alias Catwoman. She has a plan. It involves not just Batman's allies, but his enemies as well. Like Selina, Jason Shawn Alexander is aided by other artists. But his smokey, smudgy drawings drive this Vertiginous take on the Dark Knight onward. Then it's a change of logo to (bat) signal a change in creative team. Tom Taylor handles the script, taking Batman back to before his beginning. Bruce Wayne learns the single most important event in his life, the murder of his parents, was the result of a decision his father made to save a man's life. Decades later, that choice haunts Batman like the scent of white musk that follows the killer leaving a trail of dead delinquents. Meanwhile, Bruce gets a dose of a new serum that promises to reverse aging, then gets a kiss from the woman promoting it. But is she who she says she is? What does her wonder drug have to do with an infamous reform school? The whole Bat-family gets involved, giving artist Mikel Janin a chance to revel in caped crusaders.
