Krakoa has fallen. The homeland for mutantkind is gone. Mutants are forced back in the general population of a world that hates them. While others have gone underground, set up new headquarters, or confronted the new reality (see 741.5 #142), perhaps the most powerful mutant of them all has taken leave of our big blue marble. Jean Grey, host of the omnipotent entity known as the Phoenix, has made outer space her new theater of operation. She stops a sun from going nova, rescues a bunch of bad guys from a Nova prison, frees an army of zombie Asgardians from Odin's curse, and rumbles the Black Order, enforcers of the will of the Mad Titan, Thanos. And what thanks does she get? Her father-in-law Corsair cons her, Gorr the God Slayer tries to slay

her, and Gladiator of the Imperial Guard (Marvel's swipe of the Legion of Superheroes) is jonesing the Galactic Council into doing her in. Well, at least Eternity invited her to join it, the In-Betweener and other cosmic avatars on their special God Squad. Artist Alessandro Miracolo draws good Skrulls in Orbital Resonance, available at Central, Eastside and Marksbury. Far beneath the celestial shenanigans of Phoenix lies the dark and dirty world of wetwork and black ops. Espionage is the game, and Mystique once again is a player. She's Most Wanted, by a lot of cops and lots of robbers, too, including Nick Fury per et fils. Lies fly swift and deadly as bullets, and there's plenty of both as Raven Darkholme searches for her wife, AKA the psychic Desti-



Both Epic Collections under discussion compile comics published between 1978 and 1980. This was a transitional period for Marvel Comics Group. With Stan Lee getting kicked upstairs to the Publisher's office, writer Marv Wolfman had ascended to the top spot as Editor-in-Chief. Already a fan favorite for his Tomb of Dracula series, Wolfman took over Marvel's top two titles. He brought to Amazing Spider-man and Fantastic Four the complicated plots and emotional intensity that typified his horror hero work. He introduced new villains like Jigsaw, Black Cat and the Invincible Man while bringing back classic foes such as Mysterio, the Red Ghost and Doc Ock. Meanwhile, both titles hit their 200th issue, with Spidey having a major throwdown with the thief who killed his uncle and Mister Fantastic's literal face-off with Doctor Doom. Artistically, Keith Pollard did his best Romita (with an assist from previous ASM penciller Jim Mooney) and his best Kirby (with those awesome splash pages of alien worlds and giant machines) right before that new kid from Canada, John Byrne, started working for the House of Ideas. Another new name shows up in the credits: Jim Shooter, whose fabled tenure as Marvel's Editor-in-Chief begins here!

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ny. Matt Hollingsworth brings a Steve Dillonesque toughness to Declan Shalvey's hard-boiled spy epic available at Central and Northside. Meanwhile, Corsair also shows up in the second volume of the latest X-men series. He's come to Earth to warn his son, Scott "Slim" Summers, AKA Cyclops, that a bunch of bounty hunters from beyond the stars are after his hide. Scott and his gang triumph, thanks to the returning Alpha Flight. But that victory leaves some collateral damage, mainly a brain-dead space whale the size of an ocean liner, now possessed by a very peeved mutant girl. Then there's the return of Cassandra Nova, a decommissioned Sentinel, and the NEW "new X-men" hustling for a Hostile Takeover at Central, Marksbury and Northside!
