









"Here's my card," says Vader Ryderbeck. "I'm currently working on how people use the internet to assume multiple identities." And so the would-be reporter sets off a chain of events that will end in madness and tragedy. But funny madness and tragedy! After all, Vader and his co-protagonists are in a book written and drawn by that master of comedic naturalism, Peter Bagge. Other Lives first appeared in 2010, when digital platforms such as Second Life were at the height of their popularity. The other participants in this modern farce are Otis Boyd, would-be spymaster whose collegiate connection to Vader inspires him to come clean with his would-be fiancé lvy Chin, who is so bugged by Vader's unwelcome outburst of honesty she falls into the virtual arms of Woodrow Wooley, who is equally addicted to online gambling and Second World, Bagge's stand-in for Second Life. 

first work after ending his career-making comic HATE (see 741.5 #55). If anything, the normal lives of his adult characters are even more bizarre than Buddy Bradley and his hipster pals'n'gals, as you'll see when you check out Other Lives from your favorite LPL location. The life of one born Stanley M. Lieber has been the subject of several books and issue #23 of this very circular. But there's always room for more, especially when it's as sweet and lovely as With Great Power: The Marvelous Stan Lee (Page Street Kids). This "unauthorized biography" is for little kids, so Annie Hunter Ericksen's simple, expressive text covers the bare basics of Lee's career (while also giving due credit to Kirby, Ditko and others). The selling point for grown-up readers would be the lively, loopy art of Lee Gatlin. The page depicting



Spider-man and his villains -especially the Lizard!- makes me wish he drew the actual comic. Find With Great Power under EB L5156er or reserve a copy at lexpublib.org. Meanwhile, the work Lee began continues to this day, an army of creators jamming on the Marvel Universe, with over half a million pages of comics to show for their efforts. So, as you can imagine, it was a Herculean task for Douglas Wolk to read All the Marvels (Penguin Press). His "journey to the ends of the biggest story ever told" involved reading every single comic book published by Marvel since Fantastic Four #1 debuted in 1961. Fortunately, he condenses all that stuff into several themes: the "Mutant Metaphor" of X-men and its myriad spin-offs, the power of myth as explored in The Mighty Thor, what the career of the Black Panther says about leadership. Wolk also breaks into the main narrative with "interludes" discussing off-beat features



like Linda Carter, Night Nurse, and Master of Kung Fu. Find All the Marvels at Beaumont and Eastside. Those locations plus Central and Village have the latest collection of the popular webcomic "Sarah's Scribbles.". Sarah Andersen's much-memed strips about cats, books, fandom, friendship and life as a creative hot mess will make you laugh out loud. Her joyously loose-limbed drawing stands in stark contrast to that of British alternativists Shaky Kane and Krent Able. One of the cartoonists introduced by Deadline, England's answer to RAW, Kane draws his enigmatic stories in a style that looks like Jack Kirby and Frank Quitely splitting a tab of blotter. Able's work is darker and uglier, if no less mysterious, a parodic orgy of body horror and superheroic mayhem. Find Kane & Able at all LPL locations, fearless readers!
