Night Hunters are coming for you at Eastside, Northside and Village!





I had two of them. One purchased with birthday money at the local Newberry's department store, the other...a gift? I do remember the costume sets also being on sale, but never any of the really desirable outfits, like the Phantom or 龙 Captain America. Just lots of Aquaman and Lone Ranger packs. Mostly I used my two as actors, playing characters I created wearing home-made costumes.

A touchstone of Sixties boyhood, CAPTAIN ACTION debuted in American toy aisles in 1966. He was Ideal Toy Company's answer to Hasbro's ground-breaking G.I. Joe. Like Joe, the Captain was a 12 inch plastic figure with articulated limbs. Instead of Joe's panoply of military gear, Captain Action had two sets of gimmicks. He had his own costume, plus other cool stuff like his Dymaxion-like vehicle, the amphibious Silver Streak. Then there was his actual selling point: you could dress the Captain up as one of nine other heroes. Three from then-leader of the comic book industry, DC (Superman, Batman, Aquaman), two from upstart rival Marvel (Captain America and WW2 commando Sgt. Fury), three comic strip stars (the Phantom, sci-fi icon Flash Gor-



don and Cold War stud Steve Canyon) and multi-media phenom, the Lone Ranger. The next year saw the addition of Jim Shooter took his shot, but Spider-Man, the Green Hornet, Buck ultimately, his ideas didn't mat-Rogers and Tonto. the Marvel Comics Group in the 1970s. Captain Action gave the restive Kane the space to work out some of the new ideas he had concerning what could be done with a page of comics. His debut, the second issue with inks by Wallace Wood (right), is one of the most gorgeously violent comics of its era. Fists, boots, heads and bodies come flying out at the reader in an amped-up mix of Jack Kirby and Burne Hogarth. Kane's intro of nemesis (and new action figure) Dr. Evil (below) was a psychedelic freak-out worthy of Steranko and Moscoso. A city collapsing under siege...the explosion of a terrorist's bomb...an angry mob's descent into madness...all as Captain Action swoops and swings through the chaos in a bravura display of masculine musculature: these set the stage for the, yes, *action*-packed covers and stories which made the Bronze Age so badass. 














Thanks to those ever-popular supply chain issues, it took a while for LPL to get the latest from British imprint Self Made Hero's series, "Art Masters" (see 741.5 #15). Previous editions dedicated to Picasso, Magritte and Van Gogh are joined by Diego Rivera. The vitality of both the man and his art is captured by the sweeping, loose line work of Joe Luis Pescador. That almost cartoonish rendition of the rumpled, rugged Rivera is brought to solid earth by a masterful use of watercolors. The script by Francisco de la Mora follows Rivera as he pursues his muse from Mexico to Europe and back again. Rivera was a truly 20th Century artist in that he saw the extent to which the creator was as much a work of art as his creations; indeed, the book starts with a quote that in part reads "Diego is a creator of myths, an inspirer of myths, and whosoever concerns themselves with him must fall into mythomania." That includes his notorious relationships with women, including long-suffering wife Lupe and, of course, Frida Kahlo. Even Trotsky calls him out: "What you are is a paint-



completely in love with yourself...as a painter." One of the best of the Art Masters series, Diego Rivera is available at Central, Eastside and Village. Meanwhile, Mexican culture continues to flavor the all-American melting pot as evidenced by the new entry in another series, Lowriders by Cathy Camper and Raul the Third. Published by Chronicle Kids, Lowriders to the Rescue is the fourth of the Juvenile graphic novels that have won praise and prizes from around the world. The intrepid trio of mechanic Lupe Impala, Flapjack the octopus and artistic Elirio the mosquito make a new friend when they encounter Sokar. Sokar is a monarch butterfly whose migrating family, culturally patterned after Arab Americans, are trapped by a forest fire. Flapjack also needs glasses and some real estate shysters are up to no



In the barrio. It's a rollicking adventure that follows a convincingly child-like logic in both plot and pictures, Raul the Third's spontaneous drawing displaying an expertly slapdash charm. In stark contrast, P. Craig Russell's layouts for Neil Gaiman's Norse Mythology keep his artists, well, not on the straight and narrow, exactly. These are Norse myths, after all, chockfull of seduction and treachery and murder. But they sure look pretty, whether drawn by the Marks Horath and Buckingham at their most Russellesque or the smoky colors and woodcut line work of Gabriel Hernandez Walta. Norse Mythology V2 is available at all LPL locations. Given how many Norse myths are about their Aesir menfolk getting married off to giantesses, I'm betting they would find favor with writer Leopold Von Sacher-Masoch. The man who-unwittingly, unwillingly-gave name to one of the foremost forms of alternative sexuality is the



subject of this excellent graphic biography from Fantagraphics, Man In Furs. Von Sacher-Masoch was a prolific novelist and editor of a popular journal. But all that was erased under the shadow of his monstrous muse, Wanda Von Sacher-Masoch. The living embodiment of Leopold's desires for domination, Wanda is as much a subject of Man in Furs as poor Leopold, who is haunted by the reality and reputation of a life he sought to leave behind. Anne (The Empress Cixtisis) Simon's art is a eyecatching blend of clunky humanity and belle epoque intricacy. Man In Furs is available at Beaumont and Central. A new cat joins the crew, a femme longhair who wields her big fluffy tail like Wanda V snapped a whip as she bosses around the New Guy at the Office.
