Although consistently outsold by the more established Avengers, The Defenders was more emblematic of the Bronze Age. Instead of headliners like Thor and Iron Man, Marvel's "non-team" was originally formed by outsiders who had lost their own titles. Of the crucial three, Doctor Strange, Submariner and the Hulk, only Ol' Greenskin had a book of his own when the Defenders debuted in the fall of 1971, and even Hulk was not yet the big star he would become. That "Island of Misfit Toys" vibe would be the defining feature of the series to its end.



Now enjoy the unruly beginnings of the Defenders in the new hardback Omnibus at Central. It's action-packed angst Mighty Marvel style, from the struggle against the Undying Ones that brought the team together to their trend-setting crossover with the Avengers, with campaigns against the Evil Mutants, the Wrecking Crew and Xemnu the Titan in between. Meanwhile, Hawkeye and Luke Cage stop by and step up while the original Valkyrie and Nighthawk join the inner circle, setting the stage for the really weird stuff coming in the second volume!



Alternative cartoonist MEGAN KELSO returns with an anthology of graphic short stories and novelettes rendered in a variety of styles. Known for offbeat narratives such as those showcased in Artichoke Tales (now available at all LPL locations), Kelso chooses, with one notable exception, to hew closer to everyday reality in these tales of domestic drama and familial history. And even "Cats In Service" (be-



low), rings true to life. Kelso's lovely line work is on full display in the pre-war historical "Corin Voss". But Kelso shows a talent for color, experimenting with watercolors in "The Egg Room" and color pencils in the confessional "Golden Lasso." The highlight is "Watergate Sue," (top), set during said Seventies scandal, drawn and colored like pages from the Sunday funnies. Find *Pancakes* at all LPL locations!





Brubaker & Martin's riff on old school Scholastic Books heroes continues with the second volume of Friday. Former child detective Friday Fitzhugh deals with the aftermath of the brutal death of her ex-partner-in-crimebusting, Lancelot Jones. The authorities are in a big hurry to sweep it all under the rug, especially that woman from the County. As Friday shakes off her sorrow and goes on the hunt for answers, she receives the final Casebook of Lancelot Jones, the first in a series of clues that nearly leads Friday to her death at the hands of...but that would be telling, and you need to read this wonderful mystery On A Cold Winter's Night, available at all LPL locations! 
Brian Michael Bendis's espionage saga concerning the DCU's war against the superspy organization called Leviathan. The series that put Bendis's name up in lights is being re-released by Dark Horse. Powers was the series in which the former cartoonistturned-script jockey truly developed his gift for characterization and dialogue, adapting the bleak naturalism of playwright David Mamet to the needs of superhero comics. A police procedural set in a world of capes and costumes, Powers was a big influence on contemporary superheroics. V1, featuring Who Killed Retro Girl?, introduces Christian Walker and Deena Pilgrim, detectives on the "Powers" squad. V2 continues their investigations while offering some nice supplemental material. Speaking of partners...having taken up the shield of his mentor, Steve Rogers, Sam Wilson mentors in turn the new Falcon in Homeland, the first collection of his new series, Captain America: Symbol of Truth (Marvel). But that



right there- calling the man who's proven himself time and again to be worthy to carry the shield of Captain America by his civilian name -- is a recurring issue. Seems nobody wants to call Sam "Captain America". Not Arnim Zola, the Bio-Fanatic ... not the leadership of newly-democratic Wakanda...not the old leader, the Black Panther...not OG Cap's old nemesis, Crossbones, given a fresh lease on life by the terrorist known as the White Wolf. But Captain America he is, as Wilson takes charge and flies into the fray as he and his allies, including a flirtatious Misty Knight, bust up a global conspiracy involving Central American refugees and African-Americans emigrating to Wakanda. Writer Tochi Onyebuchi understands what makes a great Captain America comic: the right combination of politics, personality and POW! BAM! SMASH! Artist R.B. Silva has a grand time drawing detailed but readable pages full of top flight asskicking in this TEEN item available at all LPL locations. Central is home to the ruminative graphic novel When Everything Turned Blue. The Dark Horse transla



tion of Allessandro Baronciani's slim volume is a haunting tale of one young woman's struggle with panic attacks inspired by her overwhelming fear of disease. That's right: she's so worried about getting sick, she makes herself sick. Baronciani lightly renders a heavy subject in a simple but expressive line aided by expert use of crosshatching and a graceful balance of light and dark, all printed in a medicinal blue. The wide blue skies over the battlegrounds of WWI are where Eugene Bullard made history as the first Black fighter pilot. His story is told in an extended flashback by Bullard himself to one of his regular riders. See, it's 1959, and Eugene is the elevator operator in a Manhattan skyscraper. How he got there from the hanging trees of Georgia to the trenches of France to, finally, the air war waged far above is a harsh but inspirational tale written by Ronald (Prince of Cats) Wimberly and exquisitely drawn by Brahm Revel.
